What is curriculum?

At Our Lady of Peace primary school we put our children's needs at the centre of learning. We prioritise Health and wellbeing as the heart of our curriculum. Looking after our pupils' physical and mental wellbeing is a priority.

Using a child centred approach, teaching staff plan collaboratively with their colleagues, as well as other agencies, to provide meaningful learning experiences for our children.

There are eight curricular areas in Scotland's Curriculum for excellence. These are;

- Expressive arts
- Health and wellbeing
- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Religious education
- Sciences
- Social studies
- Technologies.



Literacy, numeracy and health and wellbeing are recognised as being particularly important – these areas are seen as being the 'responsibility of all' staff.

Effective Contributors can;


- Communicate in different ways and different settings



Health and wellbeing

At Our Lady of Peace primary we use 'Healthy Schools' as our framework to guide the teaching and planning, tracking, monitoring and evaluation of Health and wellbeing education throughout the school year. We enhance this by supporting and developing our young people's emotional literacy skills using Emotions Works.



PE - Physical Education

All of our young people receive, as their entitlement, 2 hours of quality PE per week. We follow Glasgow city council's PEPASS guidance and planners to ensure progression from P1-P7 across a range of physical and active experiences.

Religious Education

Everything we do at Our Lady of Peace primary is underpinned by our Catholic Faith and Gospel values. We use 'This is our Faith', the syllabus for Catholic religious education in Scotland and 'God's loving Plan' to inform and guide our core teaching and learning in Religious Education.



Charter for Catholic Schools in Scotland






All Catholic schools in Scotland, in honouring Jesus Christ as the Way, the Truth and the Life, will feature the following characteristics:

- a commitment to the integrated education and formation of the whole person, in close partnership with parents as the first educators of their children;
- an inclusive ethos which aims to honour the life, dignity and voice of each person, made in the image of God;
- a commitment to the search for wisdom in life and to the pursuit of excellence, through the development of each person's unique God-given talents;
- a commitment to the spiritual formation of the school community, through the shared experience of prayer and liturgy, and in partnership with local parishes;
- the provision of religious education programmes which will enable young people to develop their understanding of Gospel values and of how to apply them to life;
- a commitment to uphold the moral teaching, faith tradition and sacramental life of the Catholic Church;
- a commitment to communicate Catholic social teaching and thereby to promote social justice and opportunity for all;
- a commitment to ecumenical action and the unity of Christians;
- the promotion of respect for different beliefs and cultures and for inter-faith dialogue;
- a commitment to support the continuing professional and spiritual development of staff.

All staff appointed to a Catholic school are expected to support and promote the aims, mission, values and ethos of the school, as illustrated in this Charter.

STEM




